
WOMEN IN CONFLICT ZONES

The past year has been remarkable for the number of documentaries set in the conflict zones of the Middle East, notably Syria and Palestine, that are either made by women filmmakers or have women as their primary subjects. In both cases, they demonstrate extraordinary courage in the face of adversity that we can barely imagine: whether it be the horror of living under constant bombardment in a war zone, not knowing whether you or your loved ones will survive the day (For Sama); facing the uncertainty and hardship of life on the road as a refugee (Midnight Traveller), or standing up against the grain of centuries of oppression (The Judge), (The Perfect Candidate

Women) and Joanna Hogg (The Souvenir). We are also proud to present new films by women directors from non-English speaking countries such as Waad Al-Kateab (For Sama), Mounia Meddour (Papicha), Haifaa Al-Mansour (The Perfect Candidate), Nora Fingscheidt (System Crasher) and Alice Winocour (Proxima).

The F-Rating scheme, adopted by an increasing number of cinemas and film festivals, is designed to support and promote women and redress the imbalance in the film industry.

The F-Rating is awarded to films
1. directed by a woman
2. and/or written by a woman

If the film also features significant women on screen it is TRIPLE F-Rated

CÉLINE SCIAMMA

French director and screenwriter Céline
Sciamma's fourth film Portrait of a Lady on
Fire is released in February and is the core
for a retrospective of this talented feminist
filmmaker. Portrait-painting provides a key
to 'knowing' a subject, a knowledge that gives
rise to love, and then the memory of that love.
Sciamma's earlier feature film trilogy shows a
fascination with female identity and sexual
fluidity during adolescence: the sequel to
her 2007 debut Water Lilies, Tomboy (2011)
follows a 10-year-old transgender child through
a summer of self-discovery; Girlhood (2014)
was workshopped (like Sarah Gavron's Rocks)
with a group of girls in the projects of Paris.

In between directing her own films, Sciamma is a talented screenwriter, winning the César Award for Best Writing for her adaptation of Gilles Paris' 2002 novel *My Life as a Courgette*, screening as part of the **B2 Film Festival** (p.12-13).

MILOŠ FORMAN



Miloš Forman, who died in 2018, had a remarkable 45-year career in cinema, first in his native Czechoslovakia where his early features (Loves of a Blonde, The Firemen's Ball) helped jump-start the fabled Czech New Wave in the mid-1960s. Driven into exile in the US in 1967, he achieved huge international, commercial and critical success with runaway hits like One Flew Over the Cuckoo's Nest and Amadeus. His work is characterised by energy and passion, a strong anti-authoritarian impetus, an uncanny ability to identify iconic, contemporary trends, and, above all, plenty of black humour. He was also a great collaborator, developing a distinctive style alongside longtime cinematographer, Miroslav Ondricek, and the seamless performances from professionals and non-actors working together in his early films testify to his directing skills.

Peter Hames, critic, historian, programmer, expert in Czech and Eastern European cinema, will introduce the retrospective at the screening of Loves of a Blonde.

CHINA

Wonderful films have been coming out of Chinese cinema in recent years, witness the huge critical acclaim for recent releases: epic melodrama So Long, My Son and the trancelike technical wizardry of Bi Gan's Long Day's Journey into Night. These films go onto very limited theatrical release so it is a privilege to be able to include them in the Borderlines 2020 programme, alongside a preview of Tibetan auteur Psema Tseden's dazzling Balloon. Documentary One Child Nation picks up the theme of the one-child policy, embedded in the narrative of **So Long**, **My Son**, and gives historical context from the very personal perspective of filmmaker Nanfu Wang. And there's a different insight from the US too in Lulu Wang's tragi-comic Chinese-language family drama The Farewell, featuring an outstanding performance by the rising comic star Awkwafina.

ROMANI CINEMA



Continuing our commitment to Gypsy, Roma and Traveller cinema, we present two very contrasting screenings this year. The Deathless Woman, directed by Roz Mortimer, is a captivating and poetic experimental feature, as a woman explores the hidden history of the WW2 Roma genocide and its contemporary resurgence. And GRT on Film, brought to us by Midlands Romani filmmakers, Charles Newland and Lisa Smith, is a unique glimpse into the world of young Gypsies and Travellers in England today, as they explore their own history and grapple with the legacy of widespread social exclusion that still persists.

FESTIVAL GUESTS

Our line-up of guests this year includes directors Roger Michell (Blackbird), Ehsan Khoshbakht (Filmfarsi), Roz Mortimer (The Deathless Woman); Charles Newland & Lisa Smith (GRT on Film), composer Jered Sorkin (The Gold-Laden Sheep & the Sacred Mountain); silent film accompanist Stephen Horne (The Golem, The Cabinet of Dr Caligari); Peter Hames, expert in Czech and Eastern European cinema (Miloš Forman retrospective, Loves of a Blonde). Our programme includes three stylistically awe-inspiring movies that demonstrate the elemental power of the sea. The Lighthouse, a film that is a force of nature in itself, was shot on black-and-white 35mm film using a tight, boxy aspect ratio that replicates 19th century photography. Atmospheric sound design (eerie foghorns and piercing gulls) from Damian Volpe heightens mythological associations with the sea. British film **Bait**, set on the Cornish coast, was also shot on film, 16mm homeprocessed by filmmaker Mark Jenkin, grain, scratches and blemishes giving it a handcrafted, authentic feel. By contrast Aquarela, Victor Kossakovsky's deeply cinematic climate change documentary features footage captured at a rare 96 frames-per-second that reveals the transformative beauty and raw power of water.

Following on from the runaway success of Catcher Media films *Stories from the Hop Yards* and *Carousel*, which premiered to sold-out audiences at Borderlines Film Festival 2018 and 2019, the Herefordshire *Life Through A Lens* project now culminates in a multi-venue exhibition of photographs from the Derek Evans Studio archive 1940-70s. You may have seen the images portrayed in these films or loved them in the local press and social media: now enjoy a rare chance to get up close and personal with this visual treasure trove of Herefordshire life.

Includes: Derek's original exhibition prints and his cameras, contemporary images, talks and a pop-up dark room, where you can develop your own print.

Based in Hereford, Derek Evans worked for national press and TV in the heyday of news photography working for The Times, Telegraph and National Geographic among others. His work ranged from the everyday coverage of football matches and fetes for local papers, to exhibiting his award-winning prints across Europe.






INVISIBLE ARTS NETWORK presents

VIRTUAL AND AUGMENTED REALITY

In 2016, as an Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation, Rural Media established the Invisible Arts Network (IAN), a collective of inspiring artists, arts organisations and technologists with the aim of stimulating Digital Arts in the Marches. Supporting talent from the region, Rural Media has commissioned network members through residencies and bursaries to produce new technology-based artwork.



ACTUALITY: MIXING UP REALITY

Premiering at Borderlines, this state-of-the-art work by artist Emma Posey draws on Augmented Reality (AR) technology to produce a virtual film installation that layers digital creations on a real environment. Participants use an app downloaded onto their own mobile phone to 'discover' a virtual drive-in sized cinema screen in Hereford City Centre, then watch a looped film 'projected' within the real city centre backdrop.

Actuality challenges a time-old convention – the 'fourth wall' – an invisible barrier that separates an audience from a film's action. In breaking that 'wall', it questions how we process what is real in a digitally saturated world.

AS ABOVE, SO BELOW 6 to 8 March at the Courtyard Hereford

Young Herefordshire artists Maddie McVeigh, Belle Batkin and Ollie Lansdell present their 360 VR exploration of the river Wye. The piece includes 360 drone footage that descends into the river itself to provide a hypnotic glimpse of a part of 'unseen' Herefordshire, the bubbling, broiling energy of the Wye itself.

Borderlines audiences can try out the experience in three ways: 1) Casual exploration using an iPad connected to a monitor; 2) Using their own phone placed into a Google Cardboard "mask" for a vivid VR viewing; 3) Putting on the state-of-the-art Oculus Quest VR headset for an immersive, transformative journey along and through the Wye.

PROGRAMMER JONNY COURTNEY ROUNDS UP THE 2020 FESTIVAL



The opening scene of Bong Joon-Ho's remarkable Palme d'Or winner, Parasite, sees the camera drop down from street level to reveal a family in

their cramped apartment, confined by their social standing to a world below the surface. Their elaborate plan to escape their life is a theme that runs through a number of films in this year's festival and presents itself in so many ways.

Little Women, Portrait of a Lady on Fire, And Then We Danced, Papicha, The Personal History of David Copperfield, Run and Calm with Horses all deal with young characters who long to break free from the restrictions of society and truly express themselves.

It's an exciting time for Chinese cinema at the moment, with many Sixth Generation directors making independent films reflecting on the social and cultural complexity of the past decades, whilst showcasing their numerous talents.

Three of the films in this strand explore the far-reaching effects of the country's 'one-child' population-planning programme introduced in the 1980s. Wang Xiaoshuai's So Long, My Son chronicles the lives of two families adjusting to the vast social and economic changes taking place in China over three decades; acclaimed documentary One Child Nation follows a new mother uncovering the untold history of the one-child policy; while Balloon is a more humorous but equally poignant tale following a shepherd family in Tibet caught between tradition and modernity.

Closer to home, we feature a number of British previews including our opening Gala screening of Roger Michell's ensemble drama Blackbird, starring Kate Winslet, Sam Neil, Susan Sarandon and Mia Wasikovska; plus several superb feature debuts from emerging British filmmakers, including Rose Glass (Saint Maud), Nick Rowland (Calm with Horses), Roz Mortimer (The Deathless Woman) and Mark Jenkin (Bait), whilst established filmmaker Sarah Gavron follows the success of Suffragette with her BFI London Film Festival standout Rocks.

Women in conflict zones is a theme that runs across several films, including the brilliant, harrowing Aleppo-based documentary For Sama; the thrilling refugee documentary Midnight Traveller, (a portrait of a migrant family fleeing Afghanistan) and The Judge, which follows the first female Shari'a judge in the Middle East. These are important, urgent films, giving us glimpses into lives and stories we seldom see on screen.

As always, we like to look back and celebrate the work of great filmmakers, and this year we are highlighting a pioneer of the Czech New Wave in Miloš Forman, from the classic *Loves of a Blonde* though to the multi award-winning *Amadeus*. We also offer the rare chance to see some of Céline Sciamma's early films, *Tomboy* and *Girlhood*, following the critical acclaim of her magnificent *Portrait of a Lady on Fire*.

With our commitment to the F-rating, world cinema, festival winners, award nominees and local filmmakers, we have tried to create a programme with a true diversity of voices and views, speaking to the Borderlines regions as well as to the wider world and offering a multitude of perspectives and stories.

SUSTAINABILITY

The staff and Board of Trustees have decided that, for the launch of the 2020 Borderlines Film Festival, we will join the CULTURE DECLARES EMERGENCY campaign (culturedeclares.org) alongside other arts and cultural organisations.

WHY?

Leading climate scientists warned in October 2018 that we have as little as 12 years to make the necessary changes to avoid the worst impacts of climate change: extreme heat, drought, floods and their impact on poverty and well-being. It is an emergency that requires an urgent response from everyone at all levels of our society as we face the combined catastrophes of climate change, mass extinction of vital biodiversity, and the degradation of ecosystems.

WHY CULTURE?

Culture brings people together, providing space to talk, discuss and articulate complex subjects.

Culture can renew and transform; disrupting the status quo.

Culture builds the capacity for action.

Culture provides the opportunity to inform and learn.

WHAT WE PLEDGE TO DO

- Screen films that promote awareness of the climate change emergency and provoke discussion around these subjects. In the 2020 programme, there's 2040, Aquarela, Dark Waters, Honeyland and Weathering With You.
- Invite partner organisations, other arts and culture practitioners attending the Festival to register Culture Declares Emergency.
- Reduce our carbon footprint by only making car journeys that are necessary, encouraging lift-sharing, using public transport and

travelling on foot or by cycle. The Festival runs a virtual office with staff working from home.

- Use environmentally-friendly materials -
- our brochures are printed on PEFC certified paper (Norcote Walsum). Our designers Elfen hold a PEFC chain of custody certification and operate an environmental management system certified to ISO 14001 standards.
- our flyers are printed on FSC stock, paper sourced from sustainably managed forests, using vegetable based (linseed) inks.
- Recycle wherever possible our brochures are delivered in the boxes we reuse for voting.



What would the future look

like by the year 2040 if we simply embraced the best solutions already available to us? We could improve our planet by shifting these ideas into the mainstream. Composing a letter to his 4-yearold daughter, award-winning director Gameau combines traditional documentary footage with dramatised sequences and high-end visual effects to create a vision board for her and the future. It is an upbeat, can-do approach, with a mission to convince people that they can make a difference to climate change.

USA/France/Czechoslovakia/Italy, 1984, 3 hours

From a script by Peter Schaffer, Forman's grand gesture of a movie chronicles the peaks and troughs of the life of Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart, as told by his rival Antonio Salieri. A fellow composer, Salieri was insanely jealous of Mozart's upstart talent – the recognition of which tormented him – and claimed to have murdered him. The film swept the board at the Oscars and was phenomenally popular, probably because Forman (who had previously directed *Hair*) portrays him not as a revered classical composer but as a wild, scatological proto-hippy or rock star, thumbing his nose at convention. The film is a feast of extravagance: wigs, costumes, palaces, champagne and consumption, and is huge fun.

Her life is lived at the centre of cataclysmic conflict that intensifies as she continues to record the shrinking world around her. Her camera captures incredible stories of loss, laughter and survival as Waad wrestles with an impossible choice – whether or not to flee the city to protect her daughter's life, when leaving means abandoning the struggle for freedom for which she has already sacrificed so much.



Documentary-maker Alma Har'el's first feature is a fictionalised realisation of actor Shia LaBeouf's intense, chaotic relationship with his father. LaBeouf's autobiographical screenplay was written as a therapeutic exercise during a stint in rehab. A young actor, Otis (Lucas Hedges) struggles with alcoholism and selfdestructive behaviour. When an accident lands him into rehab. he starts examining the issues that led him there; in particular, childhood memories of his by turns abusive and loving father, an ex-rodeo clown and Vietnam veteran played (excellently) by LaBeouf himself. Potent and darkly beautiful, sometimes caustically sad - "You wouldn't be here if I didn't pay you," says Otis to his father at one point – it reflects searchingly honest and non-judgemental writing from LaBeouf, who portrays the relationship in all its tense and envious complexity. Yet Hatidze welcomes the camaraderie, and holds nothing back – neither her tried-and-tested beekeeping advice, nor her affection, nor her special brandy. But soon Hussein, the nomadic family's patriarch, makes a series of decisions that could destroy Hatidze's way of life forever.







From Ken Kesev's 1962 novel, it was Forman's big break in the US, the second film ever to win the five 'big' Oscars. Convicted of statutory rape, Randle McMurphy simulates mental illness hoping for early release through transfer to a psychiatric hospital. He finds to his cost that the oppressive men's ward run by Nurse Ratched is no soft option. The Courtyard Car Park is now operated by Automated Number Plate Recognition (ANPR). Blue Badge Holders are now required to register their car registration details at Box Office










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
