

WE SALUTE JEAN LUC GODARD... AND IRENE PAPAS

What a month September has been for the passing of legendary figures! Barely a week after the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, cinema has lost one of its most daring and dazzling innovators, the French New Wave director, Jean Luc Godard, at the age of 91.

The French President, Emmanuel Macron, tweeted in tribute, ""He was like an apparition in French cinema. Then he became a master of it. ...We are losing a national treasure, the eyes of a genius." Read the detailed obituary on the BFI website, which contains links to many more articles about Godard, his films and the directors he influenced. The end of an era, indeed.

The Greek actress, <u>Irene Papas</u>, who died on 14 September, aged 96, also came up on our radar. Known for her striking presence on stage and screen, notably in her portrayal of the heroines of classic Greek tragedy, Electra, Antigone and Clytemnestra, for the director Michael Cacoyannis. She also did an impressive line in widows, memorably in *Zorba the Greek*.

FREE ONLINE FILM FOUNDATION SCREENINGS


Martin Scorsese's Film Foundation World Cinema Project has been offering a free monthly screening of a restored film classic since earlier this summer. Anyone can sign up to the <u>Restoration Screening Room</u>, hosted on the Delphi Quest platform. Each film is available to view within a 24-hour window from 7pm on the second Monday of every month, and there's the opportunity to join in the Live chat, should you wish.

There is extensive background information, including an introduction or Q&As for every title, on the platform; these extras are available for films that have already screened.

The variety of the Screening Room's output is amazing, from film noir, to African cinema like Sarah Maldoror's 1961 Sambizanga, set at the time of the the Angolan War of Independence, to timeless classics like Fellini's La Strada.

Coming up next on October 10 is the only film directed by (and also starring) Marlon Brando, the western *One-Eyed Jacks*, followed by John Huston's version of *Moulin Rouge*, and *Lost Lost* by New York film diarist Jonas Mekas in December.

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Shropshire: Oswestry's KinoKulture set for March 2023 closure

AN OSWESTRY cinema says it is bringing more than 12 years of offering unique film experiences to an end of because of uncertainty created around the cost-of-living crisis.

KinoKulture, a community cinema in Arthur Street, will close in March 2023 because of rising bills and uncertainty over its home.

Set up in September 2010, Oswestry's community cinema has brought a lot of 'laughter, tears, conversations, entertaining and educating' but was hit hard by the Covid-19 pandemic lockdowns, and the subsequent rising energy costs.

A Kinokulture spokesman said: "It is with a heavy heart and great sadness that we have come to the very difficult decision to close

"It is difficult enough to keep a single screen cinema going in the best of times but as we head into this unknown future of spiralling costs and lack of security on our tenancy we felt that this was the only decision we could make.

But the owners of Kinokulture remain hopeful that a solution will be found in regards to the renewal of their lease.

They added: "We are incredibly grateful to everyone who has supported us over the past 12 years especially our colleagues at the BFI Film Audience Networks, the Independent Cinema Office and our film festival partners as well as all of you, our wonderful audience."

The cinema will continue to screen films until its closure next March.








21st Anniversary Edition Friday 3rd to Sunday 19th March 2023

Supported by the BFI, awarding National Lottery funding, Borderlines Film Festival returns to 22 venues and cinema screens across Herefordshire, Shropshire, Malvern and the Welsh Marches in its 21st consecutive edition. Taking place within its usual early spring slot,



the festival will show 65 features – including a large proportion of previews – with additional events over 17 days, opening on Friday 3rd March. There will be no online programme this year.

The funding, with additional support from the Elmley Foundation and Hereford City Council, will ensure that Borderlines, the UK's largest rural film festival, returns to its core venues: The Courtyard Hereford, Malvern Theatres, Ludlow Assembly Rooms, Kinokulture in Oswestry, Bromyard's Conquest Theatre, Presteigne Screen, Booth's Bookshop Cinema in Hay and village halls and community centres in the Flicks in the Sticks network, many of which are located within remote communities in this predominantly rural area.

This year, the focus is on accessibility, and Borderlines venues will be increasing the number of screenings with audio description and captioning for D/deaf audiences. There will also be a number of relaxed screenings and BSL interpretation for speakers.

Naomi Vera-Sanso, the Festival Director said, "The festival has always catered for rural audiences, who for one reason or another have difficulties with access to their nearest cinema. Now, by making more captioned screenings available, we want to remove obstacles to attendance so that Borderlines is open to an even wider range of the public."

Borderlines 2023 is again programmed by the Independent Cinema Office. The quality and range of films the festival is able to offer audiences who are based far from metropolitan centres reflects this. Award-winning films included in the festival are the 2022 winners of the Palme d'Or, *Triangle of Sadness*, the joint Jury Prize winners, *EO* and *The Eight Mountains* and the Queer Palme, *Joyland*, at Cannes; 1976, the Sutherland Prize-winner for Best

First Feature at the BFI London Film Festival 2022; the winners of the Golden Lion, All the Beauty and the Bloodshed, and Special Jury Prize, No Bears, at Venice Film Festival 2022; and Leonor Will Never Die, winner of the World Cinema Dramatic Special Jury Prize at Sundance.

Aftersun, the highly-acclaimed debut feature of Charlotte Wells, has won many awards, including six British Independent Film Awards. Cinematographer Gregory Oke, the recipient of one of these, will attend the festival to introduce two screenings of the film. Georgia Oakley's Blue Jean, another first feature in the Borderlines programme, also won multiple BIFAs. In all, 25 films in the programme are directed and/or written by women.

For 2023, Borderlines further develops its close ties with Gypsy, Romani and Traveller communities through the Hereford-based online and print magazine *Travellers' Times. How Far the Stars* comes to us from the recent Ake Dikhea? Roma Film Festival in Berlin. Our second feature, a documentary centred in the UK, *Leaving to Remain* is a heart-warming story of three Roma immigrants to the UK. Both features will be supported by short films and presented by Jake Bowers, Romani journalist and filmmaker:

The Open Screen event, initiated by the festival five years ago, provides a cinema showcase of short films made by a diversity of filmmakers within the area, many of whom have never seen their work projected on a big screen before.

Joyland from Pakistan and FO from Poland, as well as South Korean Decision to Leave, The Blue Caftan from Morocco, Close from Belgium, Corsage from Austria and Irish-language The Quiet Girl are shortlisted for International Feature Academy Awards while, All the Beauty and the Bloodshed, Moonage Daydream and Hidden Letters are up for the Documentary Feature Academy Awards.

The Eight Mountains, Leonor and The Blue Caftan are screening as previews at Borderlines, prior to their UK cinema release dates, alongside 21 other titles.

Other titles tipped for BAFTA and/or Oscar success this year include The Whale, Women Talking, The Son (Florian Zeller's followup to The Father), Living and The Banshees of Inisherin.

With so many films to choose from the Festival groups films that are connected by content, theme or nationality to provide pathways through the programme and to pick up on the zeitgeist and issues in contemporary cinema.

Four films in the programme highlight ways in which women have 'talked back', refusing to remain silent and embrace the often debilitating norms that have been traditionally foisted on them. Three young women, two sixth-form students and a local artist have helped us put together a strand called TALKING BACK.

Three powerful documentaries, All The Beauty And The Bloodshed an unconventional biopic of artist and campaigner Nan Goldin, Brainwashed: Sex-Camera-Power, a radical film essay that questions filmmaking conventions that reinforce gender stereotypes, Hidden Letters, revealing the hidden female Chinese script, Nushu, are set against the refreshingly militant debate by women in a fictional closed Mennonite community in Women Talking.

Other themes explore ties between parents and children, and how we connect to nature and the landscape. The Blue Caftan, Joyland and Blue Jean make up an interesting trio of LGBTQ+ films from countries and cultures poles apart where being openly gay is a serious and dangerous challenge.

Chile's Pinochet dictatorship 1976 is set against the fervour of recent mass protest in the same nation as My Imaginary Country. Extreme poverty and the drug world collide in Charcoal from Brazil. Then Utama (Bolivia) and The Cow Who Sang a Song into the Future (Chile) convey the threat of pollution and climate change in very different ways.

Film Noir enthusiasts will be blessed with an exceptionally rare opportunity to see two atmospheric 1950s Argentinian Film Noirs, in partnership with Film Noir UK, The Bitter Stems and The Black VampireIn tribute to one of France's greatest directors Jean Luc Godard who died in September 2022 two of his early period films Alphaville and Pierrot le Fou will be screened at Malvern and The Courtyard, Hereford,

 $The \ Festival \ will \ resume \ its \ collaboration \ with \ South \ West \ Silents \ with \ a \ screening \ of \ Erich \ von \ Stroheim's \ 1922$ extravaganza Foolish Wives, shot in Hollywood but set in the Riveria, the first one-million dollar movie. Australian accompanist Meg Morley will provide live music for the screening at Ludlow Assembly Rooms as well as for Au Bonheur des Dames, made in 1930 and set in a Parisian department store, with the film showing at Malvern Theatres.





Supported by the BFI, awarding National Lottery funding, Borderlines Film Festival returns to 22 venues and cinema screens across Herefordshire, Shropshire, Malvern and the Welsh Marches in its 21st consecutive edition. Taking place within its usual early spring slot,



the festival will show 65 features – including a large proportion of previews – with additional events over 17 days, opening on Friday 3rd March. There will be no online programme this year.

The funding, with additional support from the Elmley Foundation and Hereford City Council, will ensure that Borderlines, the UK's largest rural film festival, returns to its core venues: The Courtyard Hereford, Malvern Theatres, Ludlow Assembly Rooms, Kinokulture in Oswestry, Bromyard's Conquest Theatre, Presteigne Screen, Booth's Bookshop Cinema in Hay and village halls and community centres in the Flicks in the Sticks network, many of which are located within remote communities in this predominantly rural area.

This year, the focus is on accessibility, and Borderlines venues will be increasing the number of screenings with audio description and captioning for D/deaf audiences. There will also be a number of relaxed screenings and BSL interpretation for speakers.

Naomi Vera-Sanso, the Festival Director said, "The festival has always catered for rural audiences, who for one reason or another have difficulties with access to their nearest cinema. Now, by making more captioned screenings available, we want to remove obstacles to attendance so that Borderlines is open to an even wider range of the public."

Borderlines 2023 is again programmed by the Independent Cinema Office. The quality and range of films the festival is able to offer audiences who are based far from metropolitan centres reflects this. Award-winning films included in the festival are the 2022 winners of the Palme d'Or, *Triangle of Sadness*, the joint Jury Prize winners, *EO* and *The Eight Mountains* and the Queer Palme, *Joyland*, at Cannes; *1976*, the Sutherland Prize-winner for Best

First Feature at the BFI London Film Festival 2022; the winners of the Golden Lion, *All the Beauty and the Bloodshed*, and Special Jury Prize, *No Bears*, both at Venice Film Festival 2022; and *Leonor Will Never Die*, winner of the World Cinema Dramatic Special Jury Prize at Sundance.

Behind Huppert's many masks

Truth stranger than fiction in Jean-Paul Salomé's tale of dirty tricks

"Bonjour - let's go," says France's reigning art house queen Isabelle Huppert with a brisk flourish as we gather around to talk about one of the most incredible and intriguing roles in a career where an interviewer is spoilt for choice.

With her famed meticulous eye for detail, she plays a trade union leader in a French nuclear engineering company who became involved in a Kafka-esque scenario in which truth emerges stranger than any fiction.

Huppert has never met the subject of her portrayal of Maureen Kearney in The Sitting Duck (La Syndicaliste). She's an Irish woman who has lived in France since she arrived as teacher in her twenties and married a Frenchman. She's now 67, and has two children and two grandchildren.

Kearney, who has been described as akin to a Gallic Erin Brockovich, discovers something is amiss in a nuclear deal between France and China and decides she cannot remain silent. Her activism, she believes, led to a brutal attack in 2012 in her home in the suburbs of Paris, when she was left tied to a chair with a chilling message - "This is your second warning, there will be no third." When she reported the attack to the police, she was accused of making it up or staging the assault herself. The letter 'A' had been carved into her abdomen, and a knife handle inserted into her vagina. Traumatised, she had no memory of the assault.

"I didn't try to meet Kearney, and she made no contact with me either," said Huppert. "She had the good sense to realise that when you make a film, even if it is based on real case, there are liberties that can be taken. But we wanted to represent her physically as close as possible - hence the blonde chignon hair style, the jewellery, the bright red lipstick

and her glasses. She rarely took them off so there was something ambiguous about her hiding behind them which suited the thrust of the narrative. It was all part of the artifice of creating someone on screen - almost like putting on a mask."

Huppert, who turns 70 on 16 March, once told me "It's always a mask. Cinema is like an enigma. The characters are enigmas, too. For me, the real interest is to try to make visible what is invisible - what is behind the mask. I try to dig, to bring to the surface hidden layers. It's interesting to show the double meaning of a person.

Director Jean-Paul Salomé recently worked with Huppert in a lighter register on crime caper Mama Weed (La Daronne), in which she plays a French-Arabic translator for the Paris drug police who becomes a savvy wholesale pusher. He felt she would be perfect to incarnate Kearney after producer Bertrand Faivre brought him the book about the case written by journalist Caroline Michel-Aguirre which he adapted in collaboration with Fadette Drouard.



Huppert liked the fact that this was "a complex character. At times she shows a certain fragility and at other moments an amazing strength. Even her husband came under suspicion at one point, which must have been unbearable. She was guite a solitary person who gathered her convictions to protest. She wasn't a conventional victim in that way. When you launch yourself in a cause like this you perhaps change your view of yourself. In the struggle to clear her reputation she becomes someone else - removed from her suburban lifestyle. After all she has a meeting with François Hollande [the former French

Salomé and Drouard met up with Kearney just once in person. "After that we kept in touch a lot by email. She doesn't live in Paris any more so it was a practical consideration but also I had the feeling she preferred having the conversation by email. If I had any questions about things that I could not find in the book or about other people who were involved, I would ask and she would reply. She sent photographs of herself and that helped Isabelle build up her look."

Huppert is partnered by Grégory Gadebois who plays her husband, a sound engineer. "As a couple they were an unlikely pairing," said Salomé. "He was away often for his work and I was interested in the fact this couple managed to survive these incredibly difficult circumstances." When Huppert found she was in the cast with Gadebois she was "so enthusiastic that it was if I had told her it was going to be Robert De Niro."

The graphic gynaecological scenes during the police medical examinations presented no issues for Huppert. "They are just part of the acting game to her," said Salomé. "I was the one who was more stressed than she was. You tell her what you want her to do and how you are going to film it, and she understands immediately and gives you exactly that. She has this ability to extract herself from difficult scenes."

Another challenging aspect of the filming was "to keep a sense of ambiguity so that the audience is never quite sure of where the truth lies. Isabelle said she could play it like that and she pushed me to go further. We weren't making a documentary. At a certain moment the investigators decide to put the truth of her testimony into question. I told Maureen Kearney that I would have to put some doubts into the minds of the audience even though I was absolutely convinced of the veracity of her testimony. There were very few things that we made up but we couldn't explain everything."

Kearney has been supportive of the film and has taken part in preview screening discussions with audiences across France. According to Salomé she has seen the film three times although the first time was a big shock as she was reliving what had been horrific events.

The release of the film in France and its début at last year's Venice Film Festival has stirred up renewed interest in the case. Lawyers representing some of the people featured in the film have been in touch with the producer. "There is a bit of pressure being exerted," said Salomé diplomatically.

Huppert continues to live up to her reputation as a workaholic. When she played herself on Call My Agent!, a comedy series about a fictional talent agency with a phalanx of real-life stars, the joke was that Huppert shot one film by day and another by night. Currently she plays a flamboyant and bewigged thespian in François Ozon's Thirties period piece Mon Crime and has joined veteran André Techiné (for the first time in the 43 years since The Brontë Sisters) in Dans Le Viseur with Hafsia Herzi and Nahuel Pérez Biscayart. In between times she is off on a theatre tour to Taiwan in The Cherry Orchard by Portuguese director Tiago Rodrigues, originally created for the Avignon Festival in 2021. And Benoît Jacquot captured the art of performance at Avignon in a filmed encounter behind the scenes with Huppert and Fabrice Luchini learning their lines in By Heart (Par Coeur).

She still manages to create space in her hectic life for surprises and appreciates them when they come. She concludes: "You have to juggle the planning, of course, but I still welcome things that are not scheduled."

The film will screen at Glasgow Film Festival on Tuesday, 7 March GFT 1 20.30, plus at Dublin International Film Festival on 2 March and Borderlines Film Festival

It will be released soon in the UK and Ireland through Modern Films, with the date to be confirmed.



Joyland from Pakistan and EO from Poland, as well as South Korean Decision to Leave, The Blue Caftan from Morocco, Close from Belgium, Corsage from Austria and Irish-language The Quiet Girl are shortlisted for International Feature Academy Awards while, All the Beauty

and the Bloodshed, Moonage Daydream and Hidden Letters are up for the Documentary Feature Academy Awards.

The Eight Mountains, Leonor and The Blue Caftan are screening as previews at Borderlines, prior to their UK cinema release dates, alongside 21 other titles.

Aftersun, the highly-acclaimed debut feature of Charlotte Wells, has won many awards, including 6 British Independent Film Awards. Cinematographer Gregory Oke, the recipient of one of these, will attend the festival to introduce two screenings of the film. Georgia Oakley's Blue Jean, another first feature in the Borderlines programme, also won multiple BIFAs. In all, 25 films in the programme are directed and/or written by women.

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Borderlines Film Festival: 10 to watch

The annual feast of great cinema in the UK's largest rural film festival is well underway: here are 10 recommendations still to screen.

10 March 2023

Returning to 22 venues across Herefordshire, Shropshire, Malvern and the Welsh Marches, this year's <u>Borderlines Film Festival</u> presents over 250 screenings of 65 feature films and events between 3 and 19 March: a mix of recently released gems, previews of upcoming titles and retrospective gems, including several silent films.

Here are 10 to look out for during the remainder of this year's festival.

Pierrot le fou (1965)

One of two Borderlines screenings paying tribute to the late jean-Luc Godard, the French pioneer's fabulously colourul film from 196 is both a perfect revisit on the big screen and an accessible starting point for anyone unfamiliar with the mars's work. The also recently departed jean-Paul Belmondo and Anna Karina play a pair on the run from Paris to the Mediterranean Sea - he escaping the boredom of society; she being chased by hitmen from Algeria. The film - which combines road movie, ormance, 1960s cultural commentary and existential despair - will be introduced by critic Christina Newland.

1976 (2022)



Operating in a similar mode to many of Pablo Larrain's early films, debut director Manuela Martell's 1976 presents a refreshingly female-centric spin on the mode of thrillers about people navigating Chile under the Pinochet dictatorship. A bourgeois housewife (Aline Küppenheim) becomes a spy of sorts, after agreeing to a favour for a local priets while at her summer beach home, leading her to care for an injured young man who may be a target of the government.

Godland (2022)



Shot in academy ratio, icelandic filmmaker Hlynur Pålmason's follow-up to the acclaimed A White, White Day (2019) is a historical fiction epic where the storytelling is as slipporry as the natural environments its beleaguered, subborn protagonist encounters. That lead character is Ionish Lutheran pretex Lucia (Elliott Crosset Hovel, living in Demmark of the late 19th-century, assigned with travelling to Iceland – then a remote Danish clonly – to construct a church at a Danish settlement. His guide for the trek, Ragnar (Pålmason's regular star Ingvar Sigur'dsson), happens to hate Danes.

The Bitter Stems (1956)



An Argentinian noir from 1956, director Fernando Ayala's The Bitter Stems is known for an evocative score by legendary composer Astor Plazzolla, which combines elements of tango, jazz and classical music. Adapted from an award-winning move by journalist Addop lascs, the film sees a washed-up reporter team up with All-Hungarian immigrant to start a fake journalism-by-correspondence school, exploiting the hopes of aspiring journalists. But the arrival of an systerious weroan from the immigrant's past sparks doubts in the newspaperman: could his con artist colleague also be playing him?

One Fine Morning (2022)



With a screenplay inspired by her own father's experience with a neurodegenerative disease,
Mile Hansen-Lave produces another deceptively simple heartbreaker with One Fine Morning, Led by Léa
Seydous and Pascal Greggon, it sees the former deliver perhaps her most low-key performance to date, while
the latter French acting legend plays against type in portraying a man whose vitality and eloquence have cruelly
been taken away by fate.

Foolish Wives (1922)



Silent era visionary Erich von Stroheim wrote, directed and starred in this ambitious melodrama about a charlatan posing as a Russian court and cavalry officer, living by defrauding naive women staying in luxury hotels. Conceived by the multi-hyphenate filmmaker as a six-hour saga, he was obliged to squeeze his ambitions into a more conventional running time for distributor Universal. The recent restoration by the San Francisco Silent Film Festival and MoMA returns the original sequencing, tinting and intertities to provide the best possible impression of von Stroheim's vision. The Borderlines screening at Ludlow Assembly Rooms will feature live musical accompaniment by Meg Morley.

Au bonheur des dames (1930)



Meg Morley returns to provide musical accompaniment for another silent cinema screening, this time for one of the very last silent films produced in France. Directed by Julien Duvivier, it stars German actor Dita Parlo, who would later appear in Jean Vigol's Libanate (1934) and plan Renoirs's La Grande Illusion (1937). Be julys an innocent country girl relocating to Paris, lured away from her uncle's modest shop by the glist of the department store. An adaptation of an Émile Zola novel, the film is both a celebration of Paris at the time and a critical look at the erd's rampant rise in consumerism.

Rodeo (2022)



It's not her first rodeo, goes the famous saying, but in the case of French director Lola Quivoron and her debut film, it is. Previewing ahead of a general UK release from Curzon later in the spring, this exhilarating film first bowed in the Un Certain Regard competition at last year's Cannes, Julia (Julie Ledru, leading a largely non-professional cast) is a young misfit who's passionate about motocross riding. She meets a crew of dirt riders who perform stunts at illicit gatherings, with wild abandon and speeds. She's intent on infiltrating their maledominated world, though an accident Jeopardises her potential to find her place.

Decision to Leave (2022)



Park Chan-wook's elegant neo-noir has been on release for a while now, but any chance to catch it on the big screen should be taken up. One of its Borderlines screenings happens to be on the day of the Academy Awards, where the film was unjustly not nominated for such categories as best original screenplay, cinematography and editing, among many others. It's the slippery tale of a happily married Busan-based detective (Park Hae-il) getting a little too close to someone under his surveillance: a Chinese immigrant wife (Tang Wei) suspected of wrongdoing regarding her Korean husband's mysterious death in nearby mountains.

Full Time (2021)



Following the recent sex-worker drama Her Way (2021), Call My Agent breakout Laure Calamy leads another acclaimed vehicle, this time a pulse-pounding thriller. A stressed, debt-ridden mother of two, her character Julie scrapes by on her job as senior maid at a Paris hotel, alongside the occasional alimony payment from her ex. 50, when an interview for a better job coincides with a public transport strike, it's a race against the clock to get there on time, against the odds.

But there's more. We have some really good news to share. Two pieces of news in fact, which are neatly related. Kristy Matheson, who was the creative director of last year's trumphant Edinburgh International Film Festival, has been appointed the BFIs new festivals director. That means she will be overseeing this year's BFI London Film Festival in partnership with American Express (4-15 October 2023), and BFI Filare: London LoBTIOAF-Film Festival from the 2024 edition.

Speaking of Edinburgh International Film Festival, this comerstone of the British film calendar has been saved. Despite the shock news of the event's cancellation last year, it rises like a phoenix once more. Matheson has been working with Kate Taylor, in her new role as Programme Director, on a 78th Edinburgh International Film Festival, which will take place 18-23 August 2023, in a special one-year iteration as part of the Edinburgh International Film Festival. After that, the goal is to return the EIFF to a standalone film festival in future years.

The same goes for the London festivals Matheson is taking on. As she said when her job was announced. 'Festivals provide filmmakers, aritists and audiences with a moment to commune on a grand scale — to experience ideas, ask big questions and celebrate together." All of which is more than worth packing a case for.

And for those of you who get your kicks from vintage flicks, we have a date for your diary. Mark out 8-11 June for the <u>BFI Film on Film Festival</u> – the first festival in the UK wholly dedicated to screening works solely on film, spanning formats including 16mm, 35mm and 70mm as well as rare nitrate.



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

Rye Lane (2023)

Where's it on? Cinemas nationwide



A first feature by Raine Allen-Miller, Rye Lane is a lively romcom set on and around the eponymous Peckham street. Two twentysomethings, Yas (Vivian Oparah) and Dom (David Jonsson), are both suffering from big breakups when they happen upon each other in the toilet at an art gallery, hit it off and spend the day getting to know each other. In the course of Rye Lane's pithy 82-minute running time, the pair each has chaotic run-ins with their exes too – Yas's while attempting to liberate her copy of an A Tribe Called Quest LP from his flat. Filmed on location, Allen-Miller's debut is sharply written, the right amount of sweet and frequently hilarious.

The Age of Innocence (1993)

Where's it on? Cinemas nationwide



In the rearview mirror, this opulent Edith Wharton adaptation doesn't seem quite the curveball in Martin in the rearriest mirror, this opulant count what on adaptation doesn't seem quite the curvedain in Martin Scorsese's career as it did, 30 years ago, when it followed GoodFellas (1990) and Cape Fear (1991). Set in 1870s New York and throwing together the extraordinary team of Daniel Day-Lewis, Michelle Pfeiffer and Winona Ryder in a buttoned-up high-society love triangle, The Age of Innocence is by now one of several period properties on Marty's CV. Back in cinemas for its 30th anniversary this week, it remains one of his most ravishing achievements, a poignant story of passion and the passage of time.

One Way or Another (1975)

Where's it on? Mubi



Perhaps among the least well known films to rank in the recent Sight and Sound top 250, this landmark of Cuban cinema hasn't always been easy to see, but turned up on Mubit this week in a new 2K restoration. It's the sole feature by Sara Gómez, the first Afro-Cuban woman to make a film, who died aged 31 during the edition, process following an asthma attack. One Way or Another is a bold, raw behol of drama and documentary in which a romance between a teacher and a macho factory worker takes place against a post revolutionary urban landscape that's undergoing rapid redevelopment. Magnificent Obsession (1954)

Hudson plays the spolled rich kija, Jane Wyman the dead mar's widow – and the same duo would reunite for Sirks celebrated melodrama All That Heaven Allows (1955) the following year. Both films are out on Blu-ray in lavish editions from Criterion UK this week, inviting a fresh wallow in their gorgeous visual textures and dam-bursts of emotion.

A Bucket of Blood (1959)

Where's it on? Talking Pictures TV, Friday, 10.50pm



Banged out in a few days on the West Coast as the 1950s drew to a close, this low-budget comedy horror from Roger Corman has lasted superbly. Biting a piece out of California's beatrik scene, it sees a busboy in a hipster calf getting an unlikely opportunity to make his own waves in the art scene when he accidentally kills his landlady's cat. After he covers it in day, the feline sculpture is acclaimed as a masterpiece, prompting its creator to start looking for ligger subjects/schirts. After this 65-munite wonder, Corman reteamed with scripturiter Charles B. Griffith for further jet-black loughs: the original The Little Shop of Horrors (1960).

Joyland from Pakistan and EO from Poland, as well as South Korean Decision to Leave, The Blue Caftan from Morocco, Close from Belgium, Corsage from Austria and Irish-language The Quiet Girl are shortlisted for International Feature Academy Awards while. All the Beauty and the Bloodshed, Moonage Daydream and Hidden Letters are up for the Documentary Feature Academy Awards.

The Eight Mountains, Leonor and The Blue Caftan are screening as previews at Borderlines, prior to their UK cinema release dates, alongside 21 other titles.

Aftersun, the highly-acclaimed debut feature of Charlotte Wells, has won many awards, including 6 British Independent Film Awards.
